The US Army Brass Quintet



The U.S. Army Brass Quintet has gained a reputation as one of the most highly respected and sought after music performance teams in the military. The ensemble's entertaining style and varied repertoire has dazzled audiences and dignitaries in forty-eight states and fifteen foreign countries.

Affectionately known as the "B5", the quintet performs regularly at significant national events and ceremonies throughout the nation's capital. As the musical backdrop of choice by the highest levels of military and governmental leadership, the quintet is often hosted by

the department of defense, the state department, and the white house.

The "B5" is equally proud of their deep commitment to music education, regularly performing at colleges and conservatories across the nation to promote awareness of musical opportunities in the military.

Bernhard Scully



International horn soloist, Bernhard Scully, is currently the Associate Professor of Horn at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. He is a member of the University of Illinois Global STEAM and is Artistic Director of the non-profit 501(c)(3) Cormont Music. He spends most of his summer in the White Mountains of New Hampshire as both the Artistic Director of the Kendall Betts Horn Camp and as the horn player of the North Country Chamber Players. His solo career has spanned across many genres from classical, to jazz and beyond, including being the former long-time horn player of the Canadian Brass and former principal horn of the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra. Among his many awards are top honors at numerous competitions, most notably being the first classical brass player to win a McKnight Fellowship for Performing Musicians.

His most recent honor was being made a member of the University of Illinois College of Agricultural Consumer Environmental Sciences (ACES) "<u>Global</u> <u>Academy</u>". His Global Academy Project is a partnership with a faculty colleague, Ann-Perry Witmer from the UI School of Engineering. The project combines music and engineering in a longrange cross-disciplinary research study focusing on the relationship between the cultural and technological epistemologies of rural/indigenous regions around the world. The long-term

aspiration of the project is to establish meaningful and deep relationships with the people in each region (currently Aymara communities in Andean Bolivia, and Mende communities in Sierre Leone), learning about their place-based music, culture, and technological practices. On the musical end, this cross-cultural interdisciplinary exchange allows the horn to enter into areas it has likely never been a part, expanding it's musical scope by integrating into diverse cultural contexts. The project will culminate in a book authored by the various project collaborators entitled "Consilience".

As the Horn player of Canadian Brass, Bernhard annually toured the world over, is featured on many CD's and videos, and performed in front of orchestras that included the New York Philharmonic, Philadelphia Orchestra, Detroit Symphony, Vancouver Symphony, National Arts Centre Orchestra, and the Toronto Symphony. The Canadian Brass have been featured guest artists at prestigious music events and festivals including, Music Academy of the West, Oregon Bach Festival, Banff Centre For the Arts, Texas Music Educators Convention, Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic, Chautauqua Festival, Schleswig-Holstein Festival, NAMM Convention, and numerous others.

As Principal Horn of the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra, Bernhard was often featured as a soloist, performing notable works by Mozart, Strauss, and Britten. He toured with the SPCO both nationally and internationally, most notably performing at Carnegie Hall. His concerts with the SPCO were broadcast weekly on National Public Radio. He is also featured on the SPCO's 50th Anniversary Chamber Orchestra Festival recording. Since his departure to pursue a solo and teaching career, Bernhard has returned to play guest principal horn under the acclaimed director, Pinchas Zuchermann. He has collaborated with many great North American Orchestras including the Chicago Symphony, San Francisco Symphony, Minnesota Orchestra, Cleveland Orchestra as guest principal horn, Pittsburgh Symphony as guest principal horn, and as principal horn of the Violon du Roy in Quebec City.

As a soloist Bernhard is featured on numerous recordings. His solo album, "<u>Dialogue en Francais: French</u> <u>Masterpieces for Horn and Piano</u>" was featured on Minnesota Public Radio. His recording "<u>The G. Schirmer</u> <u>Horn Collection Volumes One, Two, and Three</u>" (Hal Leonard Publishing) includes much of the standard repertoire for horn and piano. The Instrumentalist describes these three volumes: "Scully offers musical, intuitive performances that provide a fine example for hornists of all levels. These carefully thought out publications are a good investment for future growth and belong in every horn teacher and players library." Bernhard can be heard as a featured performer on numerous Canadian Brass CD's. His latest CD, "Windows in <u>Time</u>" that features the premiere recording of Gunther Schuller's "Quintet for Horn and Strings (2009)" in collaboration with the acclaimed Jupiter String Quartet. The album also includes W.A. Mozart's "Quintet for Horn and Strings, K. 407". Gunther Schuller produced this recording himself, and this was one of the last projects he took part in before his unfortunate passing in 2015. He is featured on a new album featuring new works for horn by composer and horn virtuoso, Andrew Lewinter. His newest album is being released in 2024, featuring all new and unrecorded works by Douglas Hill.

As a pedagogue Bernhard has given lectures and master classes around the world and is a regular featured artist at international music conventions and festivals. He has been on the faculties and featured at the Chautauqua Festival, Rafael Mendez Brass Institute as a member of the Summit Brass, Music Academy of the West, Brevard Music Festival, Eastman School of Music, in residence at the University of Toronto with the Canadian Brass, Isla Verde Bronces International Brass Festival in Córdoba Argentina, Chilean Brass Festival, Jeju International Music Competition, Saint Bart's Music Festival and many others. His students now occupy positions all over the globe as performers, educators, and scholars.

His degrees are from Northwestern University (with honors), and the University of Wisconsin-Madison where he attended on a Paul Collins Distinguished Graduate Fellowship. In 2010 the University of Wisconsin awarded him a Distinguished Alumni Award for excellence in artistry. His teachers include Herman Baumann, Kendall Betts, Douglas Hill, Roland Pandolfi, Frøydis Ree Werkre, and Gail Williams. He resides with his wife, Sarah, who is a music therapist and photographer; their three daughters, Ellie, Abby, Maddie; their Springer Spaniel, Gustav Mahler; and their two cats, Kenny and Lucy.

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Charles "Skip" Snead



Charles "Skip" Snead serves as the Director of the Music School and Professor of Horn at the University of Alabama in Tuscaloosa. He has performed internationally as a soloist and chamber musician, with appearances in Egypt, Romania, the United Kingdom, and Cuba, in addition to regional horn workshops and International Horn Society Summer Symposia. He has been a featured artist with ensembles including the Alexandria Symphony in Alexandria, Egypt; the State Orchestra of Romania; the British Horn Society; the Monroe Symphony; the Macon Symphony; the Tuscaloosa Symphony; and Shreveport Summer Music Festival Orchestras. As an orchestral performer, Skip has played six seasons with the Jacksonville Symphony, and a wide range of other orchestras throughout the Southeastern United States.

In addition to the above, Skip was a founding member of the internationally recognized ensemble, the TransAtlantic Horn Quartet (TAHQ) with colleagues, Michael Thompson, Richard Watkins, and David Ohanian. The TAHQ has performed throughout the United States and Europe and has been a featured ensemble at events and venues including the Britten-Pears Festival in Aldeborough, England, the Royal Wigmore Hall in London, the British Horn Society Festival, and the International Horn Society Summer

Symposium. He has recorded with the TransAtlantic Horn Quartet, the Classic Brass, the Kentuckiana Brass and Percussion Ensemble, and has solo recordings issued by Centaur Records, Albany Records and MSR Classics.

In addition to his work as a performer, Skip is internationally recognized as a teacher and clinician. He has given master classes throughout the United States and Europe, serves on the executive board of the International Horn Competition of America, and has served a five-year term on the Center for the International Exchange of Scholars for the Fulbright Senior Specialists Peer Review Committee. He was given the "Regents' Award for Excellence in Teaching" by Murray State University (1988), and the "Burnum Distinguished Faculty Award" by the University of Alabama (2005).

His principal teachers include Merwin Crisman, William Capps, Karen Thornton, and John Dressler, He was also heavily influenced by additional studies with Phillip Farkas and Dale Clevenger.

All Performance competition participants must be registered for the full symposium in order to participate. Competitors may compete in more than one category. Winners will be announced at the featured artist concerts of the symposium.

Attendees are welcome to participate in more than one competition; we will schedule competitors to avoid schedule conflicts.

Solo Competition: University Division

The University Division will have 2 rounds. Music for the preliminary round will be unaccompanied. Music for the final round will be with piano. Students must select music from the list for each round. Pianists will be provided for the final round. The winner of the final round will be invited to perform on the final concert of the symposium. The preliminary round will be Saturday, April 13 at 10 am and will begin immediately after the High School Solo Competition. The final round will be Sunday, April 14 at 11 am. Attendees are welcome to participate in more than one competition; we will schedule competitors to avoid schedule conflicts.

This can include one longer piece of music or several shorter contrasting pieces or individual movements lasting a total of up to 10 minutes. All pieces/movement choices should be complete, not excerpts or sections of larger works. Competitors may play selected movements of a larger work. The competition will be held on April 13 at 3 pm. Attendees are welcome to participate in more than one competition; we will schedule competitors to avoid schedule conflicts.

Presentation Abstracts

Bernhard Scully, Featured Artist

The Consilience Project

Consilience - Learning About Ourselves by Applying Indigenous Traditions to Western Music and Technology", published Springer – Nature (to be published in 2024), Switzerland AG, Gewerbestrasse 11, 6330 Cham, Switzerland (In progress), co-authored by me, Ann-Perry Witmer (Faculty at UI School of Engineering), and Jessica Mingee (UI Phd Candidate in Engineering). [Consilience is the principle of identifying ground truths by gathering evidence from independent, seemingly unrelated sources. This text seeks to challenge the "ground truth" that Western traditions hold an elite status throughout the world by exploring the seemingly unrelated disciplines of music and technical development. While indigenous music is frequently consumed and enjoyed by Western listeners, it is often excluded from scholarship on the basis that it lacks the complexity and sophistication that we presume is unique to Western classical music. Deference toward Western technology is equally pervasive, leading technical professionals to avoid the perceived simplicity of indigenous technologies for fear of dumbing down their designs. Can we learn to respect and engage with place-based knowledge to enhance our Western experience, as well as reshape our understanding of Western positionality in the world? What innovations may arise if we infuse our Western practices with indigenous knowledge? A series of essays by international scholars and practitioners explores these questions together to produce a new understanding of the value of indigineity and challenge elitist Western traditions to engage with place-based originality rather than dismissing it.

Skip Snead, Featured Artist

Lecture 1: Practicing and Preparing for Success: how to be efficient, effective, and avoid the common pitfalls.

This lecture will present important and usable information providing a logical, organized, effective and efficient path to successful performance. It is important to understand both the correct mindset, and the most practical approach to practicing in order to achieve the greatest degree of success possible. It is also important to avoid the common mistakes or "pitfalls" which can be bypassed with the right knowledge and perspective. Outstanding preparation generates outstanding performance; this presentation is a "how to" guide.

Lecture 2: Achieving Success: How to win the competition or audition.

This lecture will build on the information presented in lecture #1: "Practicing and Preparing for Success". Once the concepts of successful preparation have been mastered, one must address the important elements of how to achieve success. Specific information and guidance will be offered showing the path to success, and "how to" get there. It is important to understand how determinations are made in competitions, auditions, and interviews, and what "determines" those "determinations". Individuals armed with this information are

ultimately more successful because they know what to expect, they know what is expected of them, and they know "what it takes" to succeed.

The John J. Graas Collection: Resources for the Horn in Jazz available through the IHS Online Music Sales

This proposal is for a presentation that features music from the John J. Graas collection published by the IHS Online Music Sales. Graas was a pioneering jazz hornist and active composer. His music was donated by his widow to the IHS Archive when it was housed at Ball State University. A few hornist/scholars, notably Verle Ormsby, have studied and curated the Graas archive, but in 2013 an agreement was made between Ball State, the Graas family, and Jeffrey Snedeker, to digitize and publish Graas's compositions in this collection. So far 22 works have been released. This presentation will feature information and musical examples of works available through the IHS Online Music Sales.

Hand and/or Valve, Part 4: The Moment of Truth--Paris Conservatoire Concours Pieces for Horn in 1903 and 1904.

This presentation builds on previous lectures about the final transition from natural to valved horn at the Paris Conservatoire over the years 1891-1907. This particular presentation focuses on 1903-1904, the years identified by the teacher at the time, François Brémond, as the pivot point for the permanent change to valved horn in the concours. A brief summary of concours repertoire, required techniques, available technologies, and attitudes in play over the entire period will serve as a backdrop for performances, with commentary, of the two concours pieces from those pivotal years.

Contributing Artists



Jennifer Brummett received her Bachelor of Music degree from the Juilliard School and a Master of Music degree at Southern Methodist University. She served as Principal Horn of the Spokane Symphony from 2002-14 and a member of the Solstice Quintet 2004-2009. Jennifer has performed at the Tanglewood Institute, the Chautauqua Festival, the Waterloo Festival, the Spoleto USA Festival, the Music in the Mountains Festival (Durango,CO), and as Principal Horn of the Utah Festival Opera. Internationally, she performed the Penderecki Sextet with the Lands End Chamber Ensemble in Calgary and also played Principal Horn on Frank Sinatra's Diamond Jubilee International Tour. Jennifer also performed as soloist at the 2016 International Horn Symposium in Ithaca, NY, the Schumann Konzertstück with the Florida West Coast Symphony, the Mozart Concerto No. 2 with the Spokane Symphony, the Britten Serenade with the Texas Chamber Orchestra, and many others. As a composer, Ms.

Brummett and has written songs for a musical called Mama which was produced in 2017 and has created several short works for alphorn.



Michael Simpson is a teacher, conductor, composer, and performing musician in the Pacific Northwest United States. He holds bachelor degrees in Music and Education, and a Master of Arts in Teaching from the University of Washington, Seattle, where he studied horn with Christopher Leuba. Simpson studied jazz improvisation with legendary saxophonist Don Lanphere, and has performed with Karryn Allison, New York Voices, Bobby Shew, Bill Ramsay, Jiggs Whigham, Wycliffe Gordon, Pete Christlieb, John Pizzarelli, the Jim Knapp Orchestra, Seattle Rock Orchestra, the Long Winters, and Frank Sinatra, Jr.

Mike continues to explore improvisation in the Horn world. He is a previous winner of the International Horn Symposium Jazz Horn competition, and has presented jazz improvisation performances at many NW Horn Symposia and

International Horn Symposia. He has led improvisation workshops in Washington, Idaho and California, and has composed works for horn ensemble, horn quartet, and horn soloist. In 2024, Mike will be inducted into the Washington Music Educators Hall of Fame.



Jeffrey Snedeker has been on the music faculty at Central Washington University in Ellensburg, Washington, since 1991. A Board of Trustees Distinguished University Professor at CWU, his current teaching duties include horn, music history, and directing the CWU Horn Ensemble. A founding member of the Northwest Horn Society, Jeff is a Past President of the International Horn Society, and has received several awards for teaching, research, and service, including the Washington Music Educators Association Hall of Fame and the IHS Service Medal of Honor. Jeff has been a featured artist, clinician, lecturer, and host of regional, national, and international conferences on six continents, and is recognized as a leading performer and scholar of the horn, especially solo repertoire, jazz, and historical

performance. He has published over 50 articles on a variety of musical topics, and recently completed two books, one on horn teaching at the Paris Conservatoire 1792-1903 (published by Routledge), and a commemorative volume celebrating the 50th anniversary of the IHS. He has released five solo recordings featuring the natural horn and the horn in jazz settings. Jeff has been Principal Horn of the Yakima (WA) Symphony Orchestra since 1992, and has performed with Seattle Symphony, Oregon Symphony, Spokane Symphony, Utah Symphony, Portland Baroque and Seattle Baroque orchestras, and many others.



Stacey Eliason currently is horn player and manager of Choppers Brass and Chamber Music Marysville. She has served as principal horn of the Issaquah Philharmonic, instructor of horn at Edmonds College, and president of the Northwest Horn Society. A proud member of American Federation of Musicians, she currently serves on the executive boards of both Seattle and Spokane locals. Also a successful grant writer, her recent awards have been from American Music Project, Seattle Symphony Community Stages, and Music Performance Trust Fund. A promoter of new music for the horn, she has commissioned and premiered music by composers Jeffrey Swingle, Howard Stoess, Sue Jean Park, Benjamin Gessel and Joanna Ross Hersey.

Born in Washington, Stacey Eliason was raised in a musical family. She found her artistic voice on the horn at 16 when she met her first teacher, Margaret Wilds. In 1992, Eliason began studying with Michael Hatfield at Indiana University. As part of the large horn studio at Jacob's School of Music, she also benefited from studying

fundamentals with Myron Bloom, orchestral repertoire with Robert Bonnevie, and early music performance on the natural horn with Richard Seraphinoff. In 1995 she lived in Paris, France studying at the Paris Conservatory in the solo class of Andre Cazalet and chamber music class of Jens McManama. While in Paris she performed as 2nd horn in the International Orchestra of Paris (Eckart Prue, director) as 2nd horn with the Chamber Orchestra of Normandie during their summer tour. She completed her studies in 1996 and moved back to Washington where she joined the Yakima Symphony and completed her Masters Degree at CWU. Since this time she has moved to chamber music as her main direction. She has performed solo recitals in Paris, France (Music at St. Michaels), Lake Tahoe (Incline Village Chamber Music Society), Windsor Ontario, and Chicago. More at <u>www.Mrs-Eliason.com</u>.



Jon Klein is Professor of Horn and Brass Area Coordinator at BYU-Idaho, where he plays in the Teton Brass Quintet and Prismatic Wind Quintet. He is currently principal horn of the Idaho Falls Symphony, and has played as an extra with the Boise Philharmonic, Billings Symphony, and Utah Symphony, among others. He studied at the San Francisco Conservatory, Boston University, and earned a DMA at the University of Utah.



Josiah Boothby is a versatile hornist devoted to new music, with a particular focus on improvisation and creative collaboration with composers and other artists. Josiah has performed at the Warsaw Autumn Music Festival as a soloists with composer Ewa Trebacz, and is a member of Artemisia Winds, a chamber ensemble built around a core trio with composer/performers Angelique Poteat and Ryan Hare. As an orchestral musician, Josiah is a member of the Boise Philharmonic and the Yakima Symphony, and has performed frequently with the Seattle Symphony, Vancouver Symphony, and Seattle Modern Orchestra. In addition, Josiah is a member of the Jim Knapp Orchestra, a 13-piece jazz band, and in December Josiah can also be found playing in a nine-piece jazz band

accompanying the glamorous Land of the Sweets: A Burlesque Nutcracker. When not playing his horn or teaching, Josiah can be found hiking and climbing around the Pacific Northwest, blues dancing, or staying in to engage in kitchen alchemy. Photographer credit: Ernie Sapiro © 2023.



Born and raised in Harrisonburg, Virginia, **Martin D. King** graduated from James Madison University and pursued a career as a band director. After a successful tenure with the Alleghany County Public Schools, King studied horn performance with Charles "Skip" Snead at the University of Alabama and was hired at Washington State University in 2015 after teaching horn at Mississippi State University. Dr. King currently teaches studio horn and leads the music education program at Washington State. An active and versatile performer, King plays principal horn with the Walla Walla, Mid-Columbia, and Washington Idaho Symphonies and has performed with symphonies including the Guangxi, Spokane, Yakima Symphony, Tuscaloosa, North Mississippi, and Starkville Symphonies. As a soloist, he has performed with the Saigon Wind Ensemble, the Mississippi State Chorale, the Washington Idaho Symphony and the WSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble and Symphonic Band. He has performed and given lectures at regional and

international horn symposia and his new music reviews can be found in the Horn Call. An advocate of the horn in new music, he has collaborated with composers from around the world. He has recorded three albums with the Pan Pacific Ensemble and two solo albums. He lives in Pullman, Washington with his wife Amber, daughter Lily, and terrier mix Lucy.

Contributing Ensembles

The Central Washington University Horn Ensemble is made up of university students, regardless of major, interested in playing the horn. The CWUHE performs 1- 2 full concert programs per year, has released two CDs, and has been featured at numerous Northwest Horn Society workshops, Washington Music Educators Association conferences, and symposia of the International Horn Society. In 2018, the ensemble placed second in the IHS 50 Ensemble competition at Ball State University in Muncie, Indiana. The ensemble has been invited to perform at IHS 56 in Fort Collins, Colorado.

The Washington State University Horn Ensemble is made up horn players from a variety of majors at WSU. The ensemble performs at least once a semester at WSU, and has performed at every in-person Northwest Horn Symposium since 2016. The ensemble has been featured on the Washington State University Holiday Celebration Concert and the WSU Atrium Concert Series.


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
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
